GUEST EDITORIAL**ANTIQUES TODAY (from the Newark, NJ "STAR-LEDGER" - 7/22/1982)****'OB' on the right track to a high price for train**

Ever heard of a blood-curdling toy train? This one could be worth a mint if it is "OB."

*Q: I have a complete Lionel Girl's Train. It is in excellent condition. Can you tell me what it is worth? - L.G.D.*

Your Lionel Girl's Train is worth between

\$850 and \$1,000 depending on its condition and if it is "OB" - that is, in its original box, says Ted Maurer, who holds six train auctions a year at the Lionville Fire Hall in Lionville, Pa. According to Maurer, your train was introduced by Lionel in 1957 for \$39.95 with the slogan "Now She Can Do Anything He Can." In the 1958

Lionel catalogue it was called the Lady Lionel and cost \$49.95. The transformer was white and gold, the locomotive pink and the freight cars pastel colors. "It is dreadful looking. The colors made any American boy's blood curdle," says Maurer. By 1959 Lionel discontinued it and dealers were dumping the set for \$19.95. Maurer said

a friend of his picked one up for \$18 and when Maurer auctioned his friend's entire collection in 1973 he got \$600 for the girl's set. Maurer says the price has gone up since then because collectors seeking the 6464 series of box cars pay around \$160 for the box cars alone and there are two in each set. It is hard to find the pastel cars in

good condition, though, because the paint chips easily and every fingermark shows on the light colors. In used condition the set will bring \$200 to \$300 at auction, Maurer says. If you want to sell your set at one of his auctions, write to Ted Maurer, 1931 N. Charlotte St., Pottstown, Pa. 17864.
