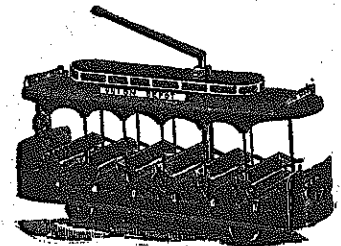
meet LES MORRIS

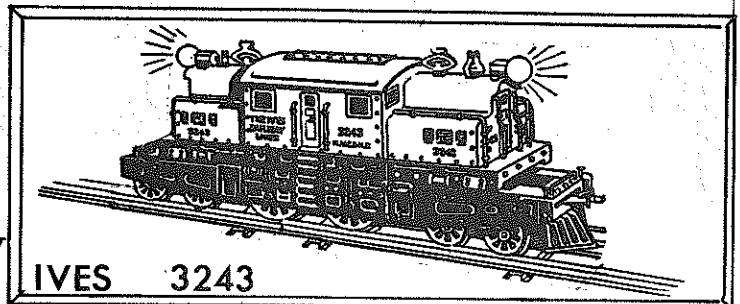
Perhaps many of these deals are merely a matter of misunderstanding. Whatever the cause, METCA would like to make a study and see just how widespread the sharpie practice is.

Camera stores sell tiny round self adhesive tabs used for identification of color slides which come numbered from 1 to 999, and in several colors. These are ideal for identifying cars and locomotives. Just press the tab underneath the car or loco. In a master notebook, jot down the number and such other information as may be important, such as: Manufacturer, Number, Color, Date acquired, From Whom, Amount Paid, or Estimated Value, Misc., Date sold... Duplicate equipment can be stored in plastic bags such as sold in super markets for freezing food, etc. RAILROAD MODEL CRAFTSMAN's new plastic subscription bags, still scarce, can also be used for the same purpose if opened carefully. Such bags accept even small standard gauge equipment and protect them from dust and scratches. Two bags can be joined with Scotch Tape to hold big items. Such bags are also great for storing duplicate books, magazines, and catalogs... In actual trading by mail, always be accurate in your descriptions. If an item is badly scratched, don't say "it was used by a little old collector on Sundays". Don't use the terms "Mint" or "Brand New" unless the items are actually that. "Mint" infers never out of the box and still sealed. An item can be "Never Run" and still be in terrible condition... In mail order trades, postage or shipping charges are usually an extra but not always.
